Earlier in my career, I was in contact with two experts involved with AOAC activities on vitamins analysis. A training was organized in my laboratory in Uruguay, and I invited both to participate. After the training, one of them, **David Woollard** from Eurofins in New Zealand, invited me to join AOAC. I have been a member since August 2006.

In September 2006 in Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, I attended my first AOAC Annual Meeting. Since then, I have participated in all AOAC Annual Meetings and have been involved in many different AOAC activities. I participate because AOAC activities are beneficial for me and my laboratory, but also because it is very gratifying to help AOAC achieve its goals.

I have been a member of the AOAC Stakeholder Panel on Infant Formula and Adult Nutritionals (SPIFAN) since its inception, and a member of the Stakeholder Panel on Strategic Food Analytical Methods (SPSFAM) since last year. I serve on different AOAC expert review panels (ERPs; Pesticides in Tea, Aloin, Whey Casein) to evaluate candidate methods for possible First Action adoption. I have participated in various nutrient analysis committees. Previously I served on the Editorial Board, and am currently a reviewer for the Journal of AOAC INTERNATIONAL.

I am also an active member of the AOAC Latin America and Caribbean Section. During the AOAC Annual Meeting in Dallas, Texas, USA, in 2008, I networked with people from South America who were interested in reinvigorating the Section, which had been inactive for some years. Together, we contacted more AOAC members and, the following year, we held our first Latin America and Caribbean Section meeting. Since then, three annual Section meetings have been organized in Mexico, Chile, and Argentina. This year, the AOAC Latin America and Caribbean Section will host its annual meeting in Mexico.

ous committees, ERPs, and the Latin America and Caribbean Section, I participate in several multilaboratory testing studies, which are useful for AOAC to determine reproducibility of a method. Further, these studies help laboratories and analysts gain experience with a new methodology, and they can have the method validated in their own laboratory.

It is a valuable organization to learn about the latest methods and technology, share information, and collaborate with people working on the same topics in which I am interested. I am proud to be part of the work to develop and validate analytical standards. Through my association with AOAC, I have made friends from many different countries.
